After two-year hiatus, EnerStar Electric able to hold Annual Meeting of Members

Members of EnerStar Electric Cooperative gathered for their coop's annual meeting on Thursday, June 2 at the Paris High School Complex. A complimentary dinner was catered by Front Street Market, followed by the business meeting held in the Paris Center of Fine Arts, where the membership heard updates on the state of their cooperative.

Although he's been EnerStar's CEO since 2020, Brent Reyher addressed the co-op's memberowners for the first time, because the last two annual meetings were cancelled due to COVID-19. He discussed the cooperative business model, the power supply, industry challenges, rates and more.

"Over half of every dollar received from a member is dedicated to power supply and transmission costs," Reyher stated, adding that a Cost-of-Service Study (COSS) is underway. "Your co-op board utilizes the results of the COSS as a key resource to determine if/when rate adjustments are necessary."

Currently, Reyher's key objectives include retaining and attracting a talented workforce, service reliability improvement, community development, and continuing to be a trusted energy advisor.

Dale English, assistant secretarytreasurer of EnerStar Electric's board of directors, presented the co-op's 2021 financial statement, saying that the co-op is in good financial standing. The co-op's total revenue in 2021 added up to about \$12.9 million with \$11.9 million in expenses. The co-op's total assets were just more than \$41 million.

"Most of our assets are invested in our physical plant ...



poles, wires, substations ... those items needed to deliver electricity to you," English said. "Even with inflation, EnerStar's expenses have remained steady for the last couple of years."

As a not-for-profit electric cooperative, any excess revenue over costs is allocated to individual members based on patronage. "EnerStar remains vigilant in returning capital credits to you, the member-owners," English said. "EnerStar has refunded about 28 percent of all capital credits allocated, which is almost 4 percent higher than the average for other Illinois electric cooperatives."

After 21 years on EnerStar's board of directors, English retired from his position and was recognized for his service to the co-op and its consumer-members.

The results of the director election were announced. Jeff Murphy of Marshall, District 6, and Greg Robinson of Marshall, District 8, were both re-elected to threeyear terms on the board. With the retirement of English, Granville

Colvin of Paris was newly elected to represent District 3 on the board for a three-year term.

During the meeting, members voted to approve several bylaw changes. Changes include several wording clarifications as well as necessary changes due to COVID-19. The updated bylaws allow for greater flexibility in scheduling the annual meeting as well as allowing for electronic notification of members for the annual and special meetings, attendance of meetings via electronic means, and the ability to hold director

elections in the event an annual meeting cannot occur.

The 2022 EnerStar Electric Cooperative Annual Meeting ended with drawings for door prizes and bill credits. Every member in attendance went home with an appreciation gift.

Your cooperative's directors are EnerStar members just like you. They are elected by you and your fellow co-op members to set policy and govern the co-op. Nine directors sit on the board, residing in and representing a specific district in the cooperative. Any EnerStar member can run for director if they reside in the appropriate district.

Each director represents the members of his or her district. Working closely with the CEO/ president, the board ensures the cooperative provides quality service to its members.

Your board of directors is chosen through elections each year prior to the annual meeting. This year, Greg Robinson of Marshall and Jeff Murphy of Marshall were re-elected to the board. With the retirement of Dale English from the board, Granville Colvin of Paris, was elected to a three-year term.
